Purpose of the role

The Department of Social Anthropology is seeking to appoint an Isaac Newton Trust Academic Career Development Fellow in Social Anthropology, with a focus on medical anthropology broadly defined, including the study of health and well-being. The Fellowship is a new opportunity for exceptional scholars to contribute to both research and teaching within a Faculty and College environment, offering excellent preparation for subsequent academic appointments at Cambridge or elsewhere.

The Fellowship is offered through partnership between the Department of Social Anthropology, University of Cambridge and Hughes Hall, Cambridge with co-terminous appointments of a 70% of full time contract at the Department of Social Anthropology and a 30% of full time contract at Hughes Hall.

As an Isaac Newton Trust Academic Career Development Fellow, you will have an opportunity to:

- enjoy protected time for an independent research project;
- be embedded in a Department research and teaching culture;
- teach in Colleges in small groups;
- act as a College Director of Studies;
- teach undergraduate and Masters students in a Department setting;
- be mentored by Department members in academic skills (teaching, research, publication, grant applications, academic administration).

Eligible candidates will be at an early stage of their career and the role would suit newly qualified researchers.

Key responsibilities for University Department contract

- Develop and carry through anthropological research in line with the Fellowship research aims, managing own research independently and collaboratively.
- Assist in the organisation and presentation of seminars, conferences and workshops as required and present research at relevant conferences, communicating material of a specialist or highly technical nature.

Key responsibilities (cont.) for University Department contract

- Write up and submit for publication, over the course of the tenure, and as relevant for your research, a combination of single-authored peer-reviewed articles or book chapters and/or, a book proposal for a single authored monograph.
- Contribute to planning of joint research projects led by senior researchers.
- Assist in the preparation of proposals and applications to external bodies, eg. for funding and contractual purposes.
- Follow the reporting and ethical guidelines as set out by the, ASA, the University of Cambridge and the Department of Social Anthropology.
- Continually update knowledge and understanding in the field and translate knowledge of advances into research activity.
- Provide supervision of student classes and projects for undergraduate and taught postgraduate students.
- Plan and deliver seminars relating to own research area.
- Assist in the development of student research skills.
- Be based in Cambridge (with the exception of periods of fieldwork) and be actively
 engaged with the Department of Social Anthropology, including liaising with internal and
 external contacts and participating in networks for the exchange of information and to form
 relationships for future collaboration.
- The successful candidate may also be invited to participate in the overall contribution of the Department of Social Anthropology, as appropriate.

Key responsibilities for Hughes Hall contract

In addition to the Department duties, the Fellow will be expected to fulfil the following Hughes Hall based duties:

- The person appointed will be elected to a Fellowship of Hughes Hall and be a member of the Governing Body and therefore a trustee of the College, which is a charitable foundation.
- Fellows of Hughes Hall are expected to participate in the social and intellectual life of the College through attending academic events, appearing at mealtimes, and contributing to teaching and research activities.
- Deliver undergraduate supervisions as required by Hughes Hall.
- · Act as a Hughes Hall Director of Studies.
- Carry out duties as specified within Hughes Hall affiliation.
- Fellows who are research-active are entitled to a research expenses grant of £1,000 per annum.

The Department



The Social Anthropology Department is a leading centre globally in anthropological teaching and research. Both in the UK and beyond, a large number of anthropologists teaching in major university departments received their doctoral training here, and the current faculty members are engaged in some of the most innovative frontline research in the human and social sciences today. It is one of four Departments within the Faculty of Human, Social and Political Science, along with the Departments of Archaeology, Politics and International Studies, and Sociology.

The Department has a cosmopolitan body of teaching officers, each one at the forefront of their field. Their research ranges across the world and focuses on a broad range of topics. The Department has at present an establishment of 15 teaching officers, together with three further social anthropologists who work as curators in the Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology, which is part of the

Department. There are other social anthropologists working in Cambridge, some of them attached to colleges, who contribute to the life of the Department.

We maintain a strong tradition of broadbased undergraduate education, covering all the main core sub- disciplines in the subject as part of the Tripos in Human, Social and Political Sciences (HSPS Tripos), an interdisciplinary programme that allows students to choose from a wide range of subjects. The Department offers five postgraduate degrees - the MPhil in Social Anthropology, the MPhil in Social Anthropological Research, the MPhil in Health, Medicine and Society, the MRes in Social Anthropology and the PhD in Social Anthropology.


The University
